

Theme for the 2006 Contest:
**“Aviation Heroes—
A Celebration of African-Americans
in the Armed Services,
Past and Present”**

This year's theme focuses on the achievements of African-Americans in the armed services and the inspiration they provide to the next generation of aviation professionals. Students at Wilbur Wright College are invited to submit a 1,000-word essay that includes answers to three questions:

1. Name and explain the significance or contribution of a person and his or her accomplishments to African-Americans in the armed services, past or present. The hero you choose can be a famous person from the past or present or someone known to you personally, such as a family member or neighbor;
2. Name a career in the field of aviation and describe the responsibilities of that job and the education and experience required to pursue that job;
3. Name three things that you can do today to prepare for a career in aviation.

Getting started:

- Part 1: The armed services provided an introduction to aviation for many African-Americans throughout the years. Some of these heroes' stories are well known, such as the achievements of the Tuskegee Airmen. Some may not be as well known, such as the accomplishments of a neighbor or family member. Now is the opportunity to tell the story of a member of the armed forces who worked in the area of aviation that inspires you.
- Part 2: More than 50,000 people work at O'Hare and Midway International airports. There are pilots, flight attendants, accountants, architects, engineers, information technology professionals, writers, artists, chefs, electricians and more. With over 100 different types of jobs at an airport, there is something for every area of interest and skill. Students are encouraged to conduct interviews and gather oral histories to add depth to the learning value of this project.
- Part 3: Doing well in math and science can help prepare you for careers in the field of aviation; computer courses and specialized training may pave the way for careers in airline passenger service; knowledge of new technology can open doorways in the areas of IT and aviation security; learning a foreign language can prepare you for world travel...take a look at your interests and dreams and look at things you can do now to help bring you closer.
- Be sure to respond to all three areas.

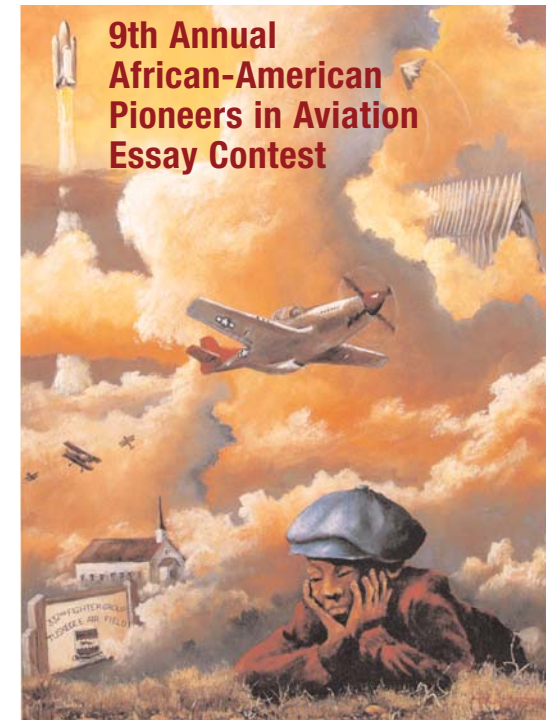
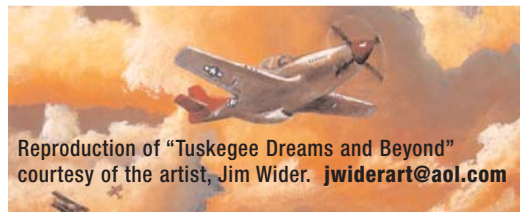

Celebrate Black History Month
with the Chicago Airport System!

Founded in 1997, the Annual African American Pioneers in Aviation Essay Contest invites students to write about an African American hero or heroine in aviation, including the Tuskegee Airmen or others who shaped aviation, and those who are making aviation history today. This year's contest also asks students to research real careers in aviation and to look at things he or she can do today to get started. Essays should be 1,000 words, and must include responses to all three parts: history, careers, and what you can do to get started.

1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes will be awarded in each of three categories: 5th-6th grade; 7th-9th grade; 10th-12th grade

1st Prize:

\$800 scholarship to Wilbur Wright College

2nd Prize:

A \$200 savings bond, courtesy of the Tuskegee Airmen, DODO chapter.

3rd Prize:

\$100 savings bond, courtesy of the Air Force Association.

Certificates of recognition will be sent to teachers for distribution to all participating students.

Sponsored by:

Eligibility:

All students enrolled at Wilbur Wright College during the time of the contest, from November 22, 2005 through February 28, 2006, are encouraged to participate in the contest.

All entries must be received at the Department of Aviation by **February 7, 2006.**

The three finalists will be invited to read their essay before a panel of judges prior to an awards ceremony for winners, their families, teachers, and original members of the Tuskegee Airmen. The details for the finalist judging and awards ceremony will be sent to finalists on February 17.
